

After 65 Years, Glassboro Still Meets in Franklin House

Some things never change. Glassboro Rotary was chartered March 21, 1924 at the borough's historic old stagecoach stop, "The Franklin House," and 65 years later it still meets there on Thursday evenings.

Glassboro Rotary is one of the oldest, and proudest, clubs in District 764, and long has had an excellent reputation for its deep civic involvement and for its commitment to the district and Rotary International.

Volney Kandle served as president of a 19-member charter club in 1924. The 1941-42 president, Glassboro State College educator Dr. Edgar Bunce, also became Glassboro Rotary's only district governor in 1947-48.

When the historic U.S.-U.S.S.R. summit meeting was held in 1967 at Glassboro State, numerous Glassboro Rotarians were involved through the community. One Rotarian, a telephone company employee, was

locked in the basement of Hollybush in event there was a breakdown in telephone communications.

When the club held its 50th anniversary in 1974, District Governor Edwin T. Schultz (Haddonfield) presented a plaque from R.I. One Rotarian had drinking glasses made for the members to commemorate the occasion.

In '77, Glassboro Rotary sponsored Timothy Trainer as an exchange student to Glasgow, Scotland. The club also built school bus shelters for the town that year.

One of the club's most successful projects, distribution of food baskets to the needy at Christmas, was launched in '79.

The year 1980 was a tragic one for Glassboro Rotary. That was the year Rotarian John Bardolf, Jr., a volunteer fireman, died while fighting a fire at Holly Inn, a Pitman restaurant.

There were two important developments in '82. Valerie Furlong, an exchange student from Ireland, was a guest for a year. Valerie not only spread the good word of Rotary during her visit, she married a Glassboro Rotarian

and remained in the country. Also during 1982 Glassboro Rotarians helped plan the remodeling of the Cerebral Palsy Center of Gloucester and Salem Counties, Inc., and contributed labor as well.

A year later, Glassboro Rotary started its annual practice of loaning electric wheelchairs, walkers and canes to the handicapped.

Sponsorship of an annual circus is one of the club's primary fund-raisers, raising \$2,900 in 1989 alone. Many recall the rain and wind storm which hit the circus the first year it was held, in 1984. The main tent was on the verge of collapse by the time the audience had been safely removed.

When President Ronald Reagan spoke to the 1986 Glassboro High School graduating class, many Rotarians volunteered to assist in an event which brought the community nationwide attention.

Glassboro Rotary initiated its unique program of X-raying trick or treat bags during Halloween '87. It has proved to be a major success.

Through the years, Glassboro Rotarians have been involved in countless important community projects such as sponsorship of Little League teams; scholarships; support of the borough's senior citizen center; and many special fund-raising endeavors. At the district level, Glassboro Rotarians have actively supported Polio Plus, Strike Out Hunger, and many other projects.

During their 65th anniversary year in '89, Glassboro Rotarians proved their district support in many ways including a big attendance push for the March 1990 district conference at Baltimore's Inner Harbor.
