Family Rotary Tradition Helps Highlight Pemberton Story


The Pemberton Rotary Club was chartered 64 years ago, but a look at today's club roster proves that "Ideal of Service" is not just an organizational philosophy. As the sons and grandsons, and, more recently, the daughters, of long-time Rotarians join the local club, it becomes clear that those ideals carried into family tradition as well.

A look back at the beginnings of Pemberton Rotary reveals many similarities to present-day activities. The club's founders met with Morris K. Perinchief to first broach the subject of a club. Perinchief, a Mount Holly funeral director, offered his club's support and sponsorship.

The first meetings were held in the Lone Oak Tea Room, a restaurant which still stands today and is known as Pemberton's Country House. The Perinchief family involvement in Rotary is kept alive by David Perinchief, Morris' grandson, an active member in the Mount Holly club.

When chartered Nov. 26, 1926, Pemberton Rotary had 18 charter members. The first president was Norman Stockett, Sr., an Episcopal minister. The secretary was Nelson B. Morton, a meat cutter in a local market. Vice president Robert Cox was superintendent of Evergreen Park for the Mentally Insane, and treasurer Jonathan Kelsey was an insurance salesman.

As it does today, the first club roster represented a cross-section of trades. Chartered to cover Pemberton and its "trade territory," the club was home to dairy farmers, lawyers, store owners, doctors, feed and grain dealers, and blueberry developers. One of the club fathers, Stanley Coville, is known nationwide for his work in blueberry development. The Coville berry is named in his honor.

Pemberton Rotary's membership rosters has included the titles of mayor, freeholder, and state assemblyman. Though times were lean in the '40s and '50s, membership was high. During that era four members - Atty Collins, Carlton Thomas, Stanley Coville, and Bill Yerkes - compiled over 100 years of perfect attendance among them. Yerkes recently was honored by fellow Rotarians for having completed 37 years of perfect attendance.

The Pemberton Rotary Club once claimed front page coverage in the Times-Advertiser each week. Publisher Jack -Armshire, a club member, usually highlighted the speaker on the front page. And for many years he wrote a column called "Cackles From the Starling," which was often gossip overheard at club meetings.

Today the club continues to warrant local coverage through its many activities. Events such as weekly turkey shoots to benefit Deborah Heart and Lung

Center, the annual auction and scholarship dinner, an extremely active and visible Interact Club at Pemberton Township High School, and recognition of outstanding citizens and business persons on a consistent basis all help to keep Rotary alive and in the forefront.

From its inception as a member club in District 50 led by District Governor Puff, Pemberton Rotary has remained a service organization. In its early years, the group directed its efforts to helping community members through years of war and depression.

While time and history have changed all of that, local Rotarians are ever mindful of the less fortunate in our communities. Hardly an inch of floor space may be found during the annual Thanksgiving basket drive, which provides staples and holiday trimmings to the area's needy.

This sort of continuity in the club is not without its share of problems, however. A visitor who refers to member Howard Emmons will soon be asked to clarify whether it is the board of education president, his son the dairy farmer, or his grandson, the current active member, of which he speaks. All three have helped to foster the "Ideal of Service" not only in their occupations, but also in the family tradition which binds members of the Pemberton Rotary Club as it embarks on yet another decade of service.
