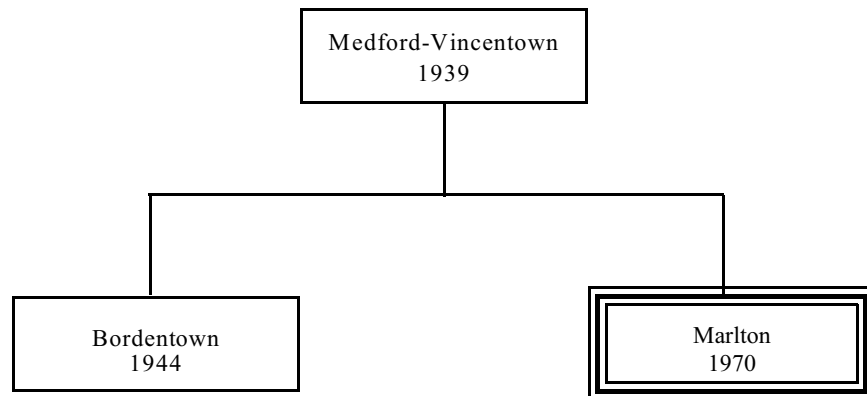

Success in Fund-Raising Arena One of Many Pluses in Marlton

When the Marlton Rotary Club celebrated its charter acceptance on March 17, 1970, there was quite a party at the Holly House in Pennsauken. Marlton, sponsored by the Medford -Vincentown Club and the newly-formed Mt. Laurel club, combined efforts to conduct a gala joint charter party.

District Governor Henry G. Naisby was on hand that night to present club charters to Marlton President John Traino and Mt. Laurel President C. William Haines, Jr.

The Marlton Rotary had 25 charter members, three of whom, including Traino, remain active

today. The others are Malcolm Roberts and William McNaul. McNaul was the charter secretary and has been the only secretary in club history.

Marlton's first meeting location was the Colonial Inn on Route 73. Since then, the club has met at seven different sites including its present one at the Greentree Inn. The club meets Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m.

Although its membership roster has been relatively small through the years, Marlton has a steady history of strong community activity and a reputation for successful fund-raising ventures.

Just a few of the fund-raisers include its merchandise club; a yard sale; crabs and beer picnic; diners' card; drawing for television set and a trip; basket of cheer-, night at the races; sale of corn at the Fourth of July picnic; sale of tickets to the Phillies; and sale of tickets to a night at the Ritz.

Marlton Rotarians became immersed in a long line of civic endeavors in their charter year by meeting on a monthly basis with Lenape High School students, donating money to the rehabilitation center, and a donation to the Burlington County Memorial Hospital in memory of charter member David D. Griscom.

Through the 1970s, Marlton Rotary provided funds for the occupational training center; to the experiment in international living; a camping equipment fund for Boy Scout Troop 114; a fund for a kidney machine; the Marlton First Aid squad; a Little League team; a Lenape High scholarship fund; a Boy Scout bus trip to Toronto, Canada; and many others.

In 1977, Marlton Rotary began one of its most ambitious and most successful projects - the Evesham Fourth of July picnic and fireworks.

One of the club's many worthwhile community highlights during the '80s was assisting with the funding effort for bulletproof vests for the local police department.

Additional activities have included the distribution of government-provided cheese and butter to senior citizens and the underprivileged; the sponsorship of RYLA students; Walk for Mankind; sponsorship of exchange students from England and Spain; support of orphaned children from San Salvador; sponsorship of programs for retarded children; donation of food baskets; participation in the Marlton Cares Program; and a Rotary float in the Fourth of July parade.
