When There's a Needy Cause, Wrightstown Is Ready to Assist

How community-minded has Wrightstown Area Rotary Club been in its brief, but highly productive, 18-year history? Including its 1988 successes, in which club members gave \$13,000 to Rotary International's Polio Plus drive and exceeded their goal by \$1,000, Wrightstown Area Rotary has raised more than \$75,000 for numerous community and international service projects.

Sponsored by Pemberton Rotary, Wrightstown was chartered Sept. 20, 1972 with Dr. Hubert Byron, a dentist who also was serving as Wrightstown mayor at the time, elected charter president.

It did not take long for Wrightstown to initiate its community spirit which flourishes gloriously today. The club came up with the money to repair the roof of a local church which had been damaged in a storm.

In 1974, the club contributed \$1.0,000 to the Deborah Heart and Lung Center in nearby Browns Mills. In 1975, it was a co-sponsor of the Special Olympics. Besides its \$3,000 donation to the Special Olympics committee, Wrightstown Rotarians prepared meals for more than 3,500 athletes.

Through the years, the club often has provided financial assistance to needy families.

The club presents plaques on a quarterly basis to outstanding soldiers and airmen at Ft. Dix and McGuire Air Force Base, as well as to the No. 1. graduate of the New Jersey State Police Academy at Ft. Dix. It honors local families and businesses for their participation in an annual beautification awards program.

Each Thanksgiving Wrightstown Rotarians host senior citizens at a luncheon. The program for the annual event is a speaker whose subject is Social Security, health care, or another topic of interest to the seniors.

Wrightstown's numerous fund-raising endeavors have been highlighted by gifts to Rotary Foundation totaling \$12,000 for use in

its Health, Hunger and Humanity program.

Also, during 1987 the club gave \$600 towards the ongoing District project in the Dominican Republic - support of the building program at a once-dilapidated Santo Domingo orphanage.

Wrightstown also takes pride in its support of a variety of projects for youth on an annual basis.

Wrightstown and Bordentown Rotary are joint sponsors of the Interact Club at Northern Burlington High School which, although established only in 1,987, already has 44 members.

Wrightstown in 1986-87 sent three local high school students to study abroad and at the same time sponsored the visits of two foreign high school students in the local community.

During 1987-88, the club sponsored one student's trip to study in Ecuador and hosted a Brazilian exchange student.

Additionally, Wrightstown annually sends two students to Stockton State College for the week-long Rotary Youth Leadership Awards seminar and provides three \$500 scholarships to students at Northern Burlington, Burlington and Allentown high schools.

Wrightstown also presents citizenship awards each year to elementary school students.

Wrightstown is frequently recognized for its strong community efforts: An achievement award from Rotary International; a district vocational award for Mike Kittis as well as the Rotary Foundation Meritorious Service in 198586; a presidential citation from M.A.T_ Caparas, '87 Rotary International president, among the many.

As further evidence of the club's commitment to be among the district leaders, Mike Kittis has been selected as district governor tor 1990-91.
